A Chopin Society of Atlanta Exclusive Interview:

Ingrid Fliter, Second Prize Winner at the Fourteenth International Chopin Piano Competition in Warsaw, is coming to Atlanta to perform a Chopin recital opening the 2005-2006 season.

An interview by Bożena U. Zaremba

You were already an accomplished pianist before you participated in the International Chopin Piano Competition in Warsaw, in 2000. What role did the Second Prize at the Competition play in your career?

Being appreciated by such a prominent jury gave me great encouragement and enthusiasm. The Chopin competition also helped me enlarge my musical horizons. After the competition my life changed a lot. My engagements increased significantly and, with such an important prize, so did the responsibility. The growth of an artist never ends, and the experience at the competition and what came after it was of a big importance in this process.



You have yourself served as a jury member at other international piano competitions. How does it feel to be on the "other side"?

It was harder than expected. On the one hand I feel relieved because my performance is no longer an object of discussion, but on the other hand I realize how complex and difficult the judgment of the jury is, and how big a responsibility one has in such a position. I put myself in the place of participants, and I understand their worries and stress and try to "forgive" minor mistakes as much as possible. In any case, all this together has been of course a great lesson for me.

What do you especially appreciate in Chopin's music?

I grew up playing Chopin's music, and it made me discover the world of beauty and the importance of finding your own voice to sing, using the piano. Chopin's music is a powerful instrument of human communication. That's one of the reasons why his music is so much beloved all over the world. The balance between the romantic expression and his classical soul is a difficult aspect to achieve when you play his music, and it is one of the most fascinating. His music is pure and transparent and still so deeply emotional and heart rending. Once "inhaled," its contagious influence affects you forever.

What are your favorite pieces by Chopin?

Definitely *Ballade No.4* and the second movement of the *Piano Concerto No.2 in F minor*. When I play the first one, I have the impression of making a trip into the deepness of a human soul and life; the fragility and the passion are continuously embracing themselves, dragging you into the ocean of desperation. The second, with its enchanting atmosphere, is one of the most beautiful pieces ever written. It is impossible not to be touched by it.

Ingrid Fliter was born in 1973 in Buenos Aires, where she completed her studies at the National Conservatoire. After having won several national competitions, she played her orchestra debut in Teatro Colon at the age of 16 and launched her solo career. In 1994 she won First Prize and the Special Prize at the International Competition for Piano and Orchestra "Citta di Cantu" in Italy and in 1998 was prizewinner of the "Ferruccio Busoni" Competition in Bolzano, Italy. She continued her studies at the Hochschule für Musik Freiburg, Germany, and in 2000 she graduated from the Music Academy "Incontri Col Maestro" in Imola, Italy. In 2000 she won the Second Prize and Silver Medal at the Fourteenth International Chopin Piano Competition in Warsaw. She has performed in important worldwide concert halls, including Kennedy Center in Washington and Lincoln Center in New York. She has participated in "The World Pianist Series," side by side with such celebrated pianists as Maurizio Pollini and Martha Argerich. She has performed with many renowned orchestras and has collaborated with distinguished conductors. Her future engagements will take her on concert tours to Holland, Poland, Mexico, Spain, Japan, Hungary, Austria, Germany, Argentina, and the United States.

Congratulations to the Chopin's Life and Work Competition Winners

It is a great pleasure to congratulate those students who participated this year in the Second Annual Competition. "Chopin's Life and Work

Competition, "Chopin's Life and Work," for Atlanta youth. The competition took place on April 23, and was

organized by Chopin Society of Atlanta in cooperation with the Polish Saturday School. Students between the ages of 7 to 15 were divided into three different groups: in English, two age groups, 7-10 and 11-14; and in Polish, one group. Students were required to recognize Chopin's music, answer test questions about Chopin's work and life, and write an essay. The questions were prepared by Maria Archetto, Professor of Music at Oxford College of Emory University.

The competition enabled students to show knowledge about Chopin not only as a pianist and composer but also as a loving and suffering man. Students demonstrated that they could easily

recognize Chopin's style and characteristic forms of music, such as mazurkas and polonaises. Students expressed their emotions and sensitivity to the beauty of Chopin's

music. One of the students wrote: "I like the way his music reflects a wide range of feelings. His music displays the rhythms and melodies of his homeland, showing his loyalty to his

homeland although he never returned after 1830. I like how his music is soft and delicate...." (Katherine Chew). More than 60 students participated in the competition.

The Thrill and the Rules

On September 23rd the thrill of the 15th International Frederick Chopin Piano Competition in Warsaw will start with the Preliminary Round. The main part of the competition won't start until October 2nd, but almost 350 participants who have registered must already be very excited and anxious; the competitive atmosphere can be nerve-wracking, and winning or not winning a prize at such a prestigious competition will dramatically affect their musical careers. But before it all begins it might be interesting to take an inside view and get acquainted with selected rules of the competition. The Competition is open to pianists of all nationalities, born between 1977-1988. At the time of

registration all participants must submit extensive documentation, including a biographical note and photocopies of musical school diplomas, as well as two letters of recommendation from renowned pianists. Besides the registration fee of \$150, the participants bear all travel costs. The organizers cover the cost of accommodation only for those participants who advance to the main part of the competition. All contestants are provided with grand pianos for practice.

The demanding program must include the works of Frederick Chopin exclusively and must be played from memory. The Preliminary Round program is to include two etudes and a piece from a mandatory list drawn by the participants two days prior to the performance. The main part of the competition consists of three stages. The program of Stage One is to include (but is not limited to) two etudes, one nocturne, a ballade, a waltz, and Preludes op. 28. Performance time in Stage One is limited to 40-45 minutes. The program of Stage Two must include a full cycle of mazurkas, a polonaise, and a sonata. During the Final Stage, participants are to play one of the concertos: in E minor op. 11 or in F minor op. 21. While it is permitted to use the scores from all available editions of Chopin's works, contestants are recommended to use "The National Edition of the Complete Works of Fryderyk Chopin" edited by Jan Ekier, a distinguished pianist, composer, professor at Music Academy in Warsaw, prizewinner at the 3rd International Chopin Piano Competition in 1937, and a frequent member of its jury.

Each contestant's performance technique and artistic merit – will be evaluated by a jury composed of outstanding Polish and international

musicians. The jury has the right to change the way prizes are awarded, and they may choose not to award specific prizes, as they did, for example, in 1990 and 1995 by not awarding the First Prize. All decisions made by the jury are final.

Not more than 80 participants will advance to the main part of the competition, and not more than 30 to Stage Two. The number of participants admitted to the Final Stage has been increased to 12 this year, but only six top finalists will receive the title of Laureate of the 15th International Frederick Chopin Piano Competition. The winner of the First Prize and Gold Medal will receive \$25,000. There will also be special prizes awarded by the Chopin Society in Warsaw for the best performance of a polonaise, by the Polish Radio for the best performance of mazurkas, and by the Polish National Philharmonic for the best performance of a concerto. The competition will be crowned with a recital by the prizewinners. An unexcused absence from that concert will result in forfeiting the prize money.

Personally, I am looking forward to the thrill, especially because it comes only every five years.
